

Literacy:

During the half term we will be writing fiction, non-fiction and poetry. We will be creating fact sheets about Pirates, linked to our History learning and doing character descriptions of a chosen pirate. We'll write stories based on our key text The Pirates are Coming and at the end of term we will be learning some sea shanties

Maths:

In Maths, we will be learning about measures, including telling the time to the O'Clock and half hour on an analogue clock. We will continue our work with money, recognising coins and finding ways to pay for some items. In calculations we will be doing multiplication and division, using our knowledge of the 2 and 10 times tables to support us.

History:

Children will find out about the lives of the famous pirates Captain Blackbeard and Ann Bonny. They will ask questions and use sources to find out about pirate life. A local smuggler William Cowerson will be studied and we will find out about his smuggling life in Worthing.

Year 1 – Summer 2nd Pirates and Smugglers – Fact or Fiction?

Geography:

This half term we will be revisiting prior learning about UK countries and capitals and the four key points on a compass. We will be revising the human and physical features of the local area and will be identifying some on our trip to the beach, where we plan to do some rock pooling.

DT: Food Technology

We will be discussing what a 'healthy diet' means. Children will be taught how to do the bridge cut and will use this to cut up fruit. They will learn basic hygiene rules of preparing food and employ these when designing and preparing a fruit kebab.

PSHE: Changing Me

Our PSHE unit this half term looks at life cycles, including humans. We will discuss the differences between girls' and boys' bodies. More information about what will be covered will be sent home.
